




Learning beyond the classroom walls

European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS)

- Performance evaluation/graduation is based on the ECTS credit system.
- Most courses are 6 ECTS (some are 3 ...).
- Typical load is 30 ECTS (5 courses) per semester.
- Allowed load is 24-34 ECTS, exceptions for underload/overload have special conditions and require approval from the Dean.
- Total of 240 ECTS needed for graduation except Industrial Engineering 244 ECTS.
- Typically completed in 8 regular semesters (4 years)

Students who miss an exam or a quiz will receive a zero on that test with no shift of weight allowed to any other grading component. Only extreme valid cases will be considered for a make-up exam and if approved, a makeup will be scheduled.

Students who miss the midterm exam must provide to the instructor, within 72 hours of the missed exam, all relevant/official documentation for missing the exam. For medical reasons, only approved medical report signed by an ER and/or qualified professional opinions issued by an AUB Mediterraneo employee will be considered. If the excuse is approved, the instructor will notify the student with the makeup exam date and time. Students who do not sit for the scheduled makeup exam will receive a zero on the exam.

The use of digital devices is allowed in the classroom strictly for class-related activities. Students may take digital notes and follow up with their laptops, tablets, etc. Misuse of devices can result in grade deduction.

University - Course Withdrawal Policy

A student can withdraw from only one required course per semester. Students who wish to withdraw from more than one required course in any given semester must petition the appropriate faculty committee for permission to do so.

Academic Integrity (cheating and plagiarism):

Please refer to <u>AUB Mediterraneo Student Code of Conduct</u>, in particular section 1.1, which concerns academic misconduct including cheating, plagiarism, in-class disruption, and dishonesty. Please be aware that misconduct is vigorously prosecuted and that AUB Mediterraneo has a zero tolerance policy. Course policy is that credible evidence of cheating will result in course failure.

Students with special needs should inform the instructor as early as possible. Proper accommodation will be arranged in consultation with the Dean.

Classroom management:

- In-person teaching with focus on interactivity (Flipped classroom, peer instruction as examples).
- In-class activities are highly recommended.
- Asynchronous learning can be scheduled in addition to regular classes.
- Support from Faculty members at AUB.
- > Training by AUB's Center of Teaching and Learning offered to AUB Mediterraneo Faculty.
- ➤ The University expects students to adhere to norms of academic integrity that accord with those of accepted international scholarly practice and professional ethics.
- ➤ The <u>student code of conduct</u> provide students with a clear statement of the standards of behaviour expected in an educational environment, and understand the consequences of their infringement of these standards.

☐ Guidelines regarding tests and exams

- Inform the students asap of the nature and the date of exams (ideally during class time).
- Check if any of your students need special accommodation during exams.
- Please use the exam template. The first page includes a statement about rules and regulations during exams.
- Grading of the exams should be completed within one week after the date of the exam.
- Students should be given the opportunity to consult their corrected exam copies during your office hours, and ask for exam re-correction, if justified.
- The exam copies should be kept with you until the end of the semester.
- Note that all exams should be done in-person and on-campus.
- Keep in mind the learning outcomes of the course when preparing the exam's questions, as the latter could be used for course assessment, which is part of developing your course portfolio.



Guidelines regarding tests and exams


- Phones, watches, tablets, ear-pods and any other electronic device should be switched OFF (not on silent mode). They should NOT be in view nor accessible at any time during the exam.
- Unless allowed by the instructor, notes and books are not allowed during the exam.
- Comings and goings are not allowed in the exam. Any student leaving the room should give his exam paper to the course instructor and not allowed to return to the exam, no matter what.
- Students arriving late to the exam should not be allowed in, unless a valid excuse is provided.
- Any infringement of the student code of conduct (attempt to cheat, cheating, disruption, talking, misbehaviour etc) during the exam will lead to automatic dismissal from the exam, a grade of zero in the exam and additional disciplinary action.
- The course instructor should be present in the exam room throughout the entire period of the exam. The course instructor can ask, if needed, another Faculty member for support in proctoring the exam.

Course Withdrawal & Repeating a Course

- A student may withdraw from courses down to a minimum of 24 ECTS (but no less) before withdrawal deadline. Exceptions to this rule has special conditions and require Dean's approval
- A student who fails a required course must repeat the course at the earliest opportunity.
- No course may be repeated more than three times (including withdrawals.)
- When a course is repeated, the highest grade is counted towards the student's overall GPA. All previous grades remain in their records, though.



Incompletes

- Incomplete course work will be reported as an "I" followed by a letter grade reflecting the evaluation of the student available at the end of the semester.
- To complete the work for a course, a student must:
 - Obtain the permission of the Instructor
 - Submit a petition with justification to complete the work within two weeks from the date of the scheduled final exam for the course.
- If petition is accepted, coursework must be completed within one month of the start of the next regular semester.
- If the request is turned down by, the "I" will be dropped. The available letter grade becomes the final grade in the course.



Placement on Academic Probation

- A student is placed on academic probation if:
 - overall average is less than 2 at the end of the first through fourth regular semester,

 OR
 - Semester average is less than 2.3 in any subsequent semester.
- For evaluation purposes, the minimum number of ECTS should be:
 - 60 at the end of the second regular semester
 - 30 in each subsequent fall or spring semester.



Removal of Academic Probation

- Probation is removed when the student attains a semester average which exceeds the applicable averages indicated in previous slides.
- Probation should be removed within two regular semesters, excluding summer, after the student is placed on probation, or when the student completes his or her graduation requirements
- Students on probation are advised to repeat courses in which they have obtained failing grades or low grades.



Dismissal and Readmission

- A student is dismissed/dropped from the faculty for any of the following reasons:
 - If overall average is less than 1.0 at the end of the second regular semester.
 - If academic probation is not cleared within two regular semesters after being put on probation.
 - If student is placed on academic probation for a total of four regular, not necessarily consecutive, semesters.
 - If student is deemed unworthy to continue for professional or ethical reasons.
- A student will normally be considered for readmission after spending a year at another recognized institution of higher education and presenting a satisfactory record and recommendation.



Dean's Honor List, Distinction, and High Distinction

- Dean's Honor List: Following the results of one semester, a student must:
 - Be carrying at least 24 ECTS
 - Not be placed on probation,
 - Have passed all the courses
 - Have attained a semester average >= 3.7 or be ranked in the top 10 percent of the class and have an overall average of GPA 3.3
 - not have been subjected to any disciplinary action within the university during the term
- To graduate with **distinction**, a student must have passed all the courses and attained an overall average of >= 3.7.
- To graduate with **high distinction**, a student must have passed all the courses and attained an overall average of >= 4.0.
